## 5 exceptionally STYLISH RESTAURANTS

#### 21 LA DAMA

Av. Diagonal 423 Eixample ③ +34 (0)93 209 63 28 la-dama.com La Dama is housed in Casa Sayrach, the Modernist marvel you never heard of. The reason is obvious: this turreted, elegant building is not open to the public... unless you go dining at La Dama. Cheap it is not, but the Galician veal, the wine cellar and the majestic surroundings make it all very much worthwhile.

#### **23 7 PORTES**

Passeig Isabel II 14 El Born ③ +34 (0)93 319 30 33 7portes.com A *gastrotaverna* paradoxically combining wood panelling with a slightly industrial feel, and a place to be seen. It is in the heart of upmarket El Born, right next to the renovated Mercat del Born.

'Seven doors' give access to as many dining salons, all with a 19th-century feel. Even the waiters with their long aprons look like they've been there for at least a century. 7 Portes serves classic Catalan cuisine in generous portions. In a neighbourhood full of tourist traps, it's a relief to find something as dependable as 7 Portes.

#### 25 WINDSOR

C/ Còrsega 286 Dreta de l'Eixample (9) +34 (0)93 237 75 88 restaurantwindsor.com Architect Lluís Domènech i Montaner, creator of marvels such as the Hospital de Sant Pau and the Palau de la Música, designed the dining room of Hotel España, and it's simply stunning. The kitchen of chef German Espinosa does the location more than justice.

Windsor, taking up the entire ground floor of the building, is divided in separate spaces, some small and private, some bigger and more opulent. During lunch it attracts businessmen, in the evening people who like the waiters' hands-on approach and the excellent, classic but classy food. Windsor knows how to handle tradition.



# The 5 OLDEST BARS

#### **136 ELS 4GATS**

Le chat noir, Els 4Gats was meant to feed
the body as well as the soul. It quickly
became the hangout for Barcelona's
artists and intellectuals; at one point it
even had its own cultural magazine. The
interior mixes elements of a traditional
Catalan tavern with artistic touches.
The lamps and furniture give the whole
a slightly medieval feel.



#### 137 LONDON BAR

C/ Nou de la Rambla 34 El Raval ① +34 (0)93 318 52 61 London Bar used to be the hangout for the likes of Dalí, Picasso and Hemingway. The interior hasn't changed in over a century. You could call this 'faded art-deco splendour' and it's very easy to love. They have lots of little concerts in the bar, so if you like it in the morning – there's something very classy about having your first cup of coffee here – do go back in the evening.

#### 138 CAFÉ DE L'OPERA

Les Rambles 74 Barri Gòtic ② +34 (0)93 317 75 85 cafeoperabcn.com Café de l'Opera started out as a *chocolateria* (chocolate cafe) sometime before 1831, then became a restaurant and found its current shape in 1929. It looks a little like a stage inside, as if you're waiting for a largerthan-life character to enter. The mirrors are engraved with feminine figures. A pleasantly old-fashioned place for a drink. Careful: on the Ramblas, therefore pricey.

#### 139 LA CONFITERÍA

C/ Sant Pau 128 El Raval ① +34 (0)93 140 54 35 confiteria.cat Why is a bar called 'the confectionery store'? Because it used to be just that. Its modernist decorations were preserved, as well as the glass cupboards and the shop windows. It's a slightly Parisianfeeling bit of history and worth a visit.

#### 140 CAN CULLERETES

They call the various spaces 'salons' and they have murals of 19-century Spaniards enjoying themselves.

They also sell other kitchen utensils, manicure and pedicure utensils, and more. The store has its own workshop. The interior takes you right back to 1911, when the store was founded.

#### 224 FARMÀCIA GALUP

Farmàcia Galup offers a wonderful example of a historic shop interior: on the walls of this 1927 pharmacy you can still see the ads for Galup products. Probably the fastest way to pick up a new toothbrush and some art at the same time.

#### 225 CASA BEETHOVEN

Les Rambles 97 El Raval ① +34 (0)93 301 48 26 casabeethoven.com Pushed into a corner next to cultural institute La Virreina, this shoebox store, open since 1880, sells sheet music, classical music on vinyl and some gift articles (e.g. music boxes). A lovely store for browsing.

# 268 THE VIEW FROM CCCB

From the building's 5th floor, you have an unusual perspective of Barcelona: from Montjuïc to the sea, and all across the roofs and courtyards of the city centre.

# 269 TORRE DE COLLSEROLA

Vallvidrera al Tibidabo Tibidabo +34 (0)93 406 93 54 torredecollserola.com This Norman Foster-designed radio tower, built for the 1992 Olympics, has since become an iconic part of the Barcelona skyline. It is open to the public: you can take an elevator to the observation deck (560 metres above sealevel) where you'll have a 360-degree view on Barcelona and the nature on the other side of Collserola Hill.

#### 270 ROOFTOP OF SANTA MARIA DEL MAR

Plaça de Santa Maria 1 El Born ③ +34 (0)93 310 23 90 santamariadelmar barcelona.org If you take a guided tour of the Santa Maria del Mar (which certainly isn't a waste of time), you'll not only get a better look at the rose windows and the marks of the 1428 earthquake, but you will also have the opportunity to go on the roof. Needless to say, the view is priceless.

# 271 CARRER DE TORRIJOS

Gràcia 🕦

The main artery of Paris-like Gràcia district is Carrer de Verdi, but only a stone's throw away is Carrer Torrijos. It takes you from Abaceria Central Market, past neighbourhood stores (including a great pastry shop, a Mexican deli and several tiny boutiques) to sunny and green Plaça de la Virreina.





#### **368 PERFUME MUSEUM**

Passeig de Gràcia 39 Dreta de l'Eixample (9) +34 (0)93 216 01 21 museudelperfum.com Bit of a misleading name, since the collection consists mainly of perfume bottles. Still, it's very informative on the history of perfume through the ages, plus of course on the bottles they came in. The collection comes in two parts: one is an historical overview and one is dedicated to 'industrialised perfume', i.e. the industry that appeared in the 18th century.

#### **369 DESIGN MUSEUM**

It has exhibitions on the four branches of design: space, product, information and fashion. It's housed in a handsome, original piece of architecture, right next to Torre Glòries.

#### 370 **MOCO**

The collection includes work by Andy Warhol, Jean-Michel Basquiat, Banksy, Salvador Dalí, Damien Hirst, Keith Haring, KAWS, Hayden Kays, Yayoi Kusama, David LaChapelle, Takashi Murakami... And it's right next to the Picasso museum, ideal for a museum double bill.

THE 8 is a boutique hostel. They really like minimalism here: black and white rule. Bathrooms come with Rituals products, the breakfast space doubles as a lounge. Carrer Aragó is a really busy street, but the noise is non-existent inside.

Partly set and shot in Barcelona, this Michelangelo Antonioni movie stars Jack Nicholson as a journalist who assumes the identity of a deceased hotel guest, in order to start a new life. 464 **REC** 

465 **BIUTIFUL** 

2010

A 'found footage' horror film that takes place at number 34 of the Rambla de Catalunya. Utterly chilling. Spawned 3 sequels and an American remake.

This Mexican-Spanish drama shows a very different side of Barcelona: the poverty of illegal migrants, street vendors and sweatshop employees. Javier Bardem plays a dying man who can't cope with the accident he caused (in which several illegal migrants were killed). A bleak movie, directed by Alejandro González Iñárritu (Amores Perros).
